Moore



"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith" (2 Timothy 4:7)

This past week has been sad for all of us, for we have lost somebody who was very much part of our lives. Moore, was to me a classmate, a colleague but above all a friend. He with another friend of ours Geraldine Moore; played a major part in nurturing me through Cancer in 2001-2002. With roles reversed, we tried in small

ways to nurture him with our care and love over these past few months.

To you he was a priest, a pastor, a confidant... who ministered in particular to the people of Gneeveguilla: but that was not how he remembered his time there. He was humbled by your ministry to him, your love, your care, your kindness. That he was receptive to that care said a lot about the man, because the solitary life often leads us to 'plough the lone furrow'

Much has been written about Moore from many sources, but the one who I felt most captures Pat's 'heartbeat' was Billy Keane. He's a chip off the old block and like his father before him has a wonderful capacity to capture the character of North Kerry and the essence of the people who live there. It did not surprise me either that they were kindred spirits, for Pat Moore was a spiritual man who also had a great love of literature and writing.

'Where's Moore?" asked one of the lads. "Gone off to be a priest," replied Sullivan. I got a fit of laughing.

"Moore a priest? Sure he's mad for the girls."

Kirby called him Young Moore's Almanac. Moore was inquisitive and learned quickly.

When we were raising a hullabaloo, he was reading Dickens under the desk." (Billy Keane March 16 2015)

As Gearoid Walsh pointed out in his homily, Pat Moore rarely turned up for dinner on his own.... for those who did the cooking, 'The miracle of the loaves and fishes' was made real with great regularity. In 2002, on three occasions I remember calling to him in Duagh but it was never the same person who opened the door in fact on each occasion it was a person from a different continent! Yes, Moore loved people and through his Blog and Book shared much of his journey through illness. In doing so he enabled others to give expression to their challenges. From all he has shared we could easily conclude that we knew Moore totally; but another little observation by Billy Keane struck a note with me:

Three weeks ago Moore was diagnosed with cancer of the oesophagus.

"Is it true, Pat?" "Yes, but we will deal with it. How's your mother?"

I had that same experience with Pat, we spoke about things in great depth, but there would always come a time when he would divert the conversation. That was not a fault, it was his way of letting others know that while we had explored many things, there were still a deeper level which he hadn't as yet delved into. His legacy is that he has encouraged us to explore the great mystery that is life, he never claimed to have all the knowledge, or all the answers, for there is always more to learn.

"We awake in the midst of time, our beginning is not our own, neither will our ending be. We are the middle people."

"Pollinator Patch"

In the morning of Wednesday 3rd May the First Communion class from Holy Family National School created a beautiful "Pollinator Patch" in the Nun's Graveyard. The children were helped by Chris Barron and Therese Higgins and Laura O'Leary and Martha Barron. Each child planted a number of different flowers which will be particularly good for providing nectar and pollen for bees and butterflies. They also planted a Rowan tree which will produce flowers for the insects and berries to help feed the birds during the autumn and winter. While the children were busy planting they learnt about the importance of compost and earth worms in the soil, they inspected the roots of the different plants and heard how bees and butterflies have long tongues to help them to drink the nectar from the plants. They also learnt that bees like to feed from plants of the same kind at the one time so it is important to plant the same species of plant together in clumps to help the bees to do this. The children also learnt how we depend on bees and other insects to pollinate some of the plants and crops that we rely on for food and why it is important to help look after the plants and animals that we share God's earth with. One of the last jobs of the day was given to Ms. Collins, the class teacher. This was to erect a "Bug Hotel" which will provide a sheltered spot for insects to hibernate in during the winter time.
