Knocknagree 1843

1854 SALE OF INCUMBERED PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF CORK. On Tuesday Mr. Peter Pennington put up for auction, by direction of the Commissioners, at his Sale -rooms, , the _following property consisting of three ploughlands of Knocknagree, comprising Knocknagree Mills and Demesne, together with its sub-denominations called Farrankeale, Shanbally, Park, and Scrahan, in the barony of Duhallow and County of Cork.

Lot 2-Kooclnagree and Farrankeale, containing 856 acres, 1 rood, 37 perches, and of the estimated profit rent of £380 0*. 6_jd'.. was _purchased by Mr. John Brennan, of Killarney, for £5. 200.

Lo t 3—Comprises 42Sacrea.37p. ' ; profit rent £123 0s.5d, and Ordnance valuation £107 2s. Od. After a very brisk competition between Messrs. Maybury, Brennan, and Kean Mahony, it was knocked down to the latter gentleman for £2,000.

Lot 4 Park, containing 233s Or 37p, was _purchased by Mr. Brennan for £1,530. The profit rent of the lot amounted to£87 9s. Od., the ordnance valuation to £112. 17s. and the valuation of Mr Collis ta £87 l0s. od.

Lot5 Scrahan, the profit rent of which was £137 15s. Id.; the ordnance valuation, £112 0s.0d., and the valuation of Mr. Collis, £95 12s. 0d. was knocked down to Mr. Brennan at £2,100.

TAKE NOTICE, 'THAT I, JOHN CORBETT, residing in the 1 Dwelling-house m the Village of Gneeveguilla, at the west side of the road leading from Killarney to Millstreet, and adjoining the Dwelling-house occupied by JEREMIAH CORBETT, in the Parish of Kilcummrn, Barony of Magonihy, and County of Kerry, intend, pursuant to the statute in such case made and provided, to apply at the next General Sessions of the Peace, to be held at Killarney, in and for the Division of Killarney, in said County of Kerry, on the Tenth day of OCTOBER next, for a Certificate to obtain a License for the Sale, of Beer, Cider, and Spirits by Retail, in the aforesaid House, to be consumed therein. Dated this 18th day of September, 1874. JOHN CORBETT. To all Persons concerned.

Ordinary Time

Over the past few weeks, we have marked several special celebrations in the Church's calendar: Pentecost, Trinity Sunday, and, most recently, Corpus Christi.

It was particularly fitting that our Parish Camino Group completed its 121 km pilgrimage at the Cathedral in Compostela on the Feast of Corpus Christi. There, we had the privilege of participating in a beautiful Corpus Christi procession, with a magnificent band and impressive pageantry.

Now we move on to Ordinary Time , the part of the Church year that falls outside the major liturgical seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. The word ordinary does not mean unimportant or routine. It comes from the word ordinal, meaning "numbered," as the Sundays and weeks are counted consecutively.

During Ordinary Time, we journey with Jesus through His public ministry. Week by week, the Gospel recounts His teachings, miracles, parables, and encounters with people seeking hope and healing. This season reminds us that holiness is found not only in great feasts and celebrations but also in the ordinary moments of daily life, where Christ continues to call us to follow Him and grow in faith.

It is a season of growth in discipleship, inviting us to deepen our relationship with the Lord through prayer, the sacraments, and acts of charity.

The liturgical colour for Ordinary Time is green, symbolising hope, life, and spiritual growth. Just as plants grow steadily over time, we are called to grow in faith day by day, allowing God's grace to shape our lives. Ordinary Time reminds us that holiness is found not only in special moments but also in the ordinary circumstances of daily life. As we listen to the Gospel each week, may we continue to follow Christ faithfully and bear witness to His love in our families, workplaces, and communities. "Teach me your way, O Lord, that I may walk in your truth." (Psalm 86:11)
